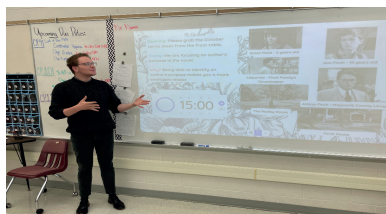


Welcome Back: An Exciting New School Year Begins for OJR Teachers

This August, Owen J. Roberts School District welcomed back more than 450 teachers to a brand new school year filled with exciting new opportunities and experiences for staff and students alike. As with many school districts, OJR's staff ranges in experience from first-year teachers to veteran educators with more than 30 years of classroom experience. While diverse, the district's teachers all share an enthusiasm for the new school year and a focus on providing students with a quality education.

For OJR High School English teacher Cole Stoecker, there is a sense of pride and motivation that comes from the opportunity to bring literature to life for students and to introduce them to works they might not have read otherwise.

"I want my students to feel comfortable and confident in their reading and communication skills," Stoecker said. "As the school year continues, my goal is to have students seek out new and harder text as they develop their writing skills and gain the skills necessary to write at a higher level – including as professionals."



While Stoecker admits to initially being a little intimidated by OJR's reputation within the community for quality education, he is thankful

for the extensive support he's received from his fellow teachers and the administration at the high school. Stoecker feels the guidance he's received has made him a better teacher and is reflected in the positive and productive relationships he's been able to foster with colleagues and students in his classroom.

"As long as a student is open to learning, I will give them everything I have to develop their reading and writing skills," Stoecker said. "I want my students and their families to know that my goal for this school year is to help students make continual progress and possess the ability to look back at the end of the school year and feel a sense of accomplishment with their progress."

Just down the hall from Cole Stoecker is Joseph Gallagher, a 30-year veteran English teacher at OJR High School. Not one to rest on his past accomplishments, Gallagher continues to push himself to evolve as an educator and utilize the latest tools available to him in the classroom.

"When I first started as a substitute teacher with OJR, we were using ditto sheets with students," Gallagher recalled. "But my focus now is working to incorporate technology into my lessons and how I keep students engaged in the content. Upwards of 90% of our class content is shared electronically, and I love to see the different approaches used by students to connect with what they've learned and present their ideas on a topic."

As part of his approach to education, Gallagher strives to create an environment that channels student energy and finds avenues for them to express their talent and ideas. For example, rather than simply reading a poem, he has students

recite a poem from memory, study its meaning and then create decorations to represent their interpretation of the piece. For Gallagher, it's all part of teaching students in a manner that feels authentic to him as an educator.

"One the best pieces of advice I can give to younger teachers is to remember the age of your audience and be yourself," he notes. "Your lessons should come across naturally and be true to your personality; otherwise students will see through what you're trying to present. While teaching can sometimes feel overwhelming for young professionals, there's a certain magic, and reward, that comes with gaining a few years of experience and finding your voice as teacher."



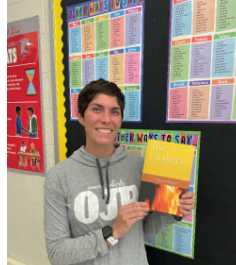
Meanwhile over at East Vincent Elementary, the school's first grade team is frequently cited by the school's principal, Dr. Edward Smith, as a prime example of the importance of collaboration and time management mastery. The three-member team includes fourth year teacher Mary Clare Culloty, 16 year veteran Mary Hoff, and Joanna Burns.

The start of every school year is filled with anticipation, and often some nervousness as students prepare for unfamiliar subjects with a new slate of teachers and classmates. While freshmen adjust to life as high school students, seniors work hard to stay focused on their final year as OJR students before they graduate. Wildcats Ayana Huff and Nori Cass are at very different stages of their high school careers. However, as both settle into their surroundings they share an excitement about their experiences thus far, in addition to an optimistic view of what's still to come.

Ayana Huff, Grade 9

"My sister is a junior, and when I asked her before school started if she had any advice for me as an incoming freshman, all she had to say was "good luck." Needless to say, I was petrified walking in on my first day.

"I had no clue where I was going, everybody in the halls seemed like adults, and all of my teachers on that first day warned us about how hard their classes would be. By lunchtime, I was convinced that I couldn't do it. That I wasn't ready, and that I wouldn't even be able to make it a month. By the end of the day, I was convinced I wouldn't even make it a week. I went home, utterly exhausted, and cried, absolutely dreading the next day.

"But like it always does, the morning came. I wandered, but it was a little easier to guess where to go. Everybody didn't seem as tall. My teachers started their lessons, but they all also started their classes by saying, "Don't be afraid to ask questions. Don't be afraid to reach out." And things got easier. I did make it through that first week. Then that first month.

"I no longer have to pay attention to where I'm walking in the halls. I've made friends with some of the upperclassmen I was so terrified of. Yes, school work is hard, but all of your teachers sincerely are there for you and will help you if you ask, I promise. I have no doubts it will only get harder as I go, but I'm not scared like I was. High school isn't some terrible beast I need to fight on my own."

For Culloty, this school year marks a crucial point in her career in which she believes she has an ideal balance of experience, in combination with relationships she's cultivated with students, families and her team.

"While understanding subject curriculum is vital; the biggest factor in fostering success in the classroom comes down to building strong, trusting relationships with my students and their families, as well as with my teammates and colleagues," Culloty said. "My teammates are amazing resources and I am completely comfortable asking for tips and strategies to help me grow as teacher. Likewise, I've come to appreciate and understand how my relationships with my students extend beyond the school day, or even the school year, and how my influence shapes them as learner."

Her more experienced colleague, Mary Hoff, shares a similar takeaway.

"I've reached the point in my career where my former students, who are now in middle school or high school, will share their memories of our time together," Hoff said. "It can be easy to forget how much of a factor we are in the daily lives of our students. We not only influence their entire school day, we also influence how they view school and how they approach their education once they leave our classroom."

Bringing together their shared and individual experiences, the first grade teachers at East Vincent stress the importance of ongoing collaboration and time management in their team's success. Together they exchange strategies and ideas, create a learning environment where everyone is comfortable asking questions, and are consistently evaluating which strategies and tactics work and which ones need adjustments.

"Creating a culture of respect is the key to everything we do as a team," Hoff notes. "Trust accelerates our planning and timing, and together we are able to create a safe learning environment that balances fresh ideas with proven approaches to student learning."

From kindergarten through grade 12, and from their first year of teaching to year 30 and beyond, OJR's teachers bring a wealth of knowledge, creativity and collaboration to their classrooms. Their commitment to excellence, and diverse experiences, have helped make Owen J. Roberts not only one of the best school districts in Pennsylvania, but also a truly special place for students to learn and grow.

Every day, at every school, you're making a profound difference in the lives of students and giving them the skills and knowledge they need to pursue their dreams. It's a privilege to work alongside all of you.

To our students and their families, thank you for your resiliency, your dedication and your unwavering support for our school district. Finally, I want to thank our residents for your continued partnership in K-12 public education. We strive every day to serve as the best representation of the communities we serve and to earn your trust as responsible stewards of the community's greatest resource – its children.

Over the last few weeks, we've had a number of big announcements that we've shared with the community and I just want to provide a quick summary of highlights for our readers.

Nothing is more important to us than the safety of our students. On October 16, 2023, OJR began a partnership with local law enforcement and BusPatrol to launch a new School Bus Safety Program. Our safety initiative is part of Pennsylvania's Operation Safe Stop to help support student safety while traveling to and from school. Our entire fleet of OJR school buses are now outfitted with automated enforcement technology to detect the license plates of vehicles that fail to stop for school buses while the stop sign is out and red lights are engaged. As always, your support for this initiative is appreciated and vital to keeping our children safe.

Next, during a recent School Board Working session, we shared the 2023 Student Assessment data with the Board. Highlights include:

Increased student enrollment for Advanced Placement and International Baccalaureate courses at the high school.

Increased mathematics scores for both 7th and 8th grade students on the PSSA at the middle school.

Every elementary grade level had increased PSSA mathematics achievement from the previous year.

Finally, I want to share that district leadership presented our updated goals for the 2023-2024 school year to the OJR Board of School Directors. These goals will guide all of our strategies and efforts throughout the school year and incorporate three primary areas: Student Wellbeing, Student Success and Infrastructure Excellence.

Student Success will focus on ensuring that all students are challenged and engaged, while providing multiple pathways for student success by broadening opportunities, building support systems and eliminating barriers. As part of this focus area, our district will work to eliminate opportunity gaps and to ensure all students are active participants in the community.

Student Wellbeing will strive to create an environment that fosters the growth and nurturing of all students' physical, mental, and social-emotional growth in healthy, safe and supportive learning environments.

And last, but certainly not least, as part of Infrastructure Excellence we will evaluate, discuss and look to finalize the ten year Master Facilities Plan and proposed Capital Financing Plan.
