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A Look Inside OJR Middle School's Award-Winning Art Program

Upon entering the classrooms of Mrs. Ingrid Fake or Mrs. Gretchen McGinnis, art teachers at Owen J. Roberts Middle School, it can be tempting to pick up a nearby paint brush and try your hand at being an artist. Inspiration is all around, ranging from works-in-progress by students to finished masterpieces ready to be shared with the world. Art supplies are neatly organized across rows of tables and the best examples of celebrated artists adorn the walls.

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Both Ingrid and Gretchen have enjoyed different paths to OJR. However, they share a common love for the power of art and the profound impact it can have in the lives of their students.

Ingrid, who's taught at OJR Middle School for more than 30 years, developed a love for teaching art while working at Elwyn as a teenager. While employed as a summer arts and crafts instructor, Ingrid saw firsthand the way art is able to transcend different communication styles and personality types to allow for uninhibited expression and positive change.

Gretchen has been with OJR for four years, after taking time away from the classroom to raise her family. As a child, she was surrounded by family members who were artists and was always drawing. When deciding on a career path, Gretchen decided to combine her love for art with a desire to be in a profession that helped others. In addition to guiding middle school students along the path to discovering art, Gretchen is also a practicing artist who focuses on still life, figures and landscapes.

Neither one originally set out to teach at a middle school. But now they cannot imagine teaching at any other level.

"I figured I would start out at the middle school. because that's where the job opportunity was, before eventually transitioning to an elementary school," Ingrid said. "But I absolutely fell in love with the energy of middle school students and the chance to help them harness their curiosity into their artistic endeavors"

Gretchen, nodding in agreement adds, "Art is a part of the human experience and most everyone wants to create something. Art in school not only gives students a means to express themselves, it also creates a well-rounded learning experience that teaches students to face challenges head-on and strive for solutions.

Anywhere from between 500 to 600 students participate in the art program at OJR Middle School each year. Working in groups, in addition to individual assignments, students crosstrain across a number of skill sets such as twodimensional design, three-dimensional design, craft construction, digital design and more. The middle school program is asynchronous and selfpaced, enabling students to learn at a steady pace or push themselves beyond the standard lessons and accelerate their journey. Depending on the assignment, students may utilize math, history or technology as part of their classroom experience. The skills developed during art class transfer to other academic subjects and the rejuvenating experience for students can help them build and maintain momentum throughout the school day.

"Our students tell us that no matter when they have art class, it helps make their day complete," Gretchen notes. "Whether they start or finish their day with art, they share that the creative process helps them tackle their next challenge."

Ingrid describes the classrooms as an "art gym for the brain" and touts the middle school's approach to art as a growth model that helps students gain confidence and gain a sense of pride in their accomplishments. She notes that along the way students discover how to research important topics, learn about their work styles and preferences, strive to overcome project challenges and focus on how they communicate and express their ideas.

"Art students are provided with tangible, realworld skills that colleges seek," Ingrid said. "Our students create portfolios and galleries of their work. Whether the student plans to pursue art as a career or not, they learn how to present themselves and showcase their credentials as a candidate for different opportunities throughout life."



While both Ingrid and Gretchen have a steadfast belief in the power of including art at the middle school level, the program's success has been gaining a lot of statewide attention in recent years. The Pennsylvania Art Education Association (PAEA) named the school an Outstanding Visual Arts Community for 2021-2022, Building on that success, this past December, Ingrid and her

East Coventry Students Learn About Tadpoles Through Reading

Throughout the month of March, students and staff participated in several activities intended to promote the importance of literacy. Literacy is an essential skill in fostering future success for all students. The March activities included a read-a-thon, the one book, one school adventure, and the annual OJR Read-in.

The read-a-thon, which is sponsored by the East Coventry Parent-Teacher organization encourages students to spend the majority of the month reading various books in order to increase the volume of which the students read. Students track their minutes and receive prizes for participating and the number of minutes that they spend reading. Additionally, cumulative minutes are recorded and grade levels compete against one another to see which students can read the most. At the end of read-a-thon, the top readers in each grade receive special recognition and prizes. Additionally,



the proceeds used from the reading challenge have helped to support various large scale school-related projects such as additional leveled readers, fencing for the play space, as well as helping to fund field trips.

On the morning of Thursday, March 2nd, students and staff from across the District cozied up in comfortable places in the classrooms and the buildings in order to participate in the OJR Readin. The annual event is intended to honor world renowned children's author Dr. Suess while helping to instill his love of literacy among the East Coventry Elementary students. At the conclusion of the Read-in, the school launched the annual One Book, One School adventure. During the launch assembly, students learned that this year's book was Life According to Og the Frog by Betty Birney. During the assembly, students learned about the life cycle of frogs from local nature expert Alex Runde from Green Valley Watershed Association. At the conclusion of the assembly, each class received an aquarium purchased by the OJR Education Foundation. The classes received a tadpole that will be kept in the classrooms for the duration of the month. Students had a chance to watch the tadpoles develop into frogs while reading a chapter a day throughout March.

Now the Calm Corner is here for them to get away and practice those skills under the supervision of Nurse Becky and Mrs. Weber. Since beginning the challenge on March 1st, students have solved a total of 317, 862 questions (and counting) and have increased their number of proficient math skills from 14, 235 to 29,456!

The winning classrooms will win a pizza party. However, the most important prize is that of knowledge! We are excited to celebrate the growth of all our French Creek mathematicians!

February 17th was a very special day at French Creek. Students in Grade 3 had the opportunity to host up to four special guests for Grandfriends' Day. This year was extra special because it was our first chance to welcome back Grandfriends' since 2020. Students escorted their guests to the library to read together, classes gathered in our large group commons area to play Bingo, and each student conducted informative and entertaining Grandfriend interviews back in their classroom. She strived to be a true friend to everyone whom she met, from classmates to teammates, and across different social groups, activities and backgrounds.

When Kelsey passed in 2011, her impact on the world was immediately apparent as the entire Owen J. Roberts community came together to grieve, to share memories and ultimately to heal. Classmates who had only know Kelsey for a few months shared stories with her loved ones about her kindness, her unfl i nching I oyalty a nd h er unique ability to make everyone feel accepted, appreciated and special. Those who knew her longer shared their love for having someone in their life who was a loyal friend through their triumphs and challenges.

Today, with the help of her family, friends and the entire community, Kelsey continues to leave her mark on the world and enrich the lives of others.

Founded shortly after her passing, <u>Kelsey's</u> <u>Legacy Forever Strong Foundation</u> has worked to carry forth Kelsey's spirit and heart by making a positive diff erence in the lives of local youth by promoting leadership development through sports, education and community outreach activities. Every year, the Foundation provides the <u>Kelsey Kramer</u> <u>Scholarship</u> to an OJR High School graduating senior who shares her values and goals, as well as embraces Kelsey's integrity, spirit and character.

In addition, <u>The Kelsey Kramer Parisi Athletic</u> <u>Training Scholarship</u> is offered through the Parisi Speed School in Downingtown. Recipients of the scholarship receive a year of speed and agility training at the acclaimed facility, where Kelsey spent much of her time. The scholarship is awarded annually to an OJR High School or OJR Middle School student-athlete who exemplifies Kelsey's characteristics and values – including academic excellence, strong leadership skills, integrity, compassion and serving as a role model.

"From an early age, Kelsey enjoyed working with kids and wanted that to be a big part of any career she chose," said Lori Kramer, Kelsey's mom. "The driving force behind all the work we do with Kelsey's Legacy Forever Strong Foundation is to do what we think she would do and make a positive diff erence in the lives of young people."

In addition to scholarships, the Foundation provides support and sponsorship for community organizations such as student clubs, summer camps, youth groups and other activities designed to serve children. The Foundation particularly focuses on enriching and educational experiences for the community's youth, such as sponsoring a recent trip by the OJR High School Black Student Union to the National Museum of African American History and Culture, located in Washington, D.C.



Kelsey Kramer and the foundation bearing her name have touched the lives of thousands in the Owen J. Roberts community. But for Lori Kramer, the work has just begun. In addition to continuing all of its existing programs, the Kelsey's Legacy Forever Strong Foundation continues to seek new ways to assist others.

As the community continues to heal from the COVID-19 pandemic, the Foundation is currently exploring opportunities to assist students with important topics such as mental and physical wellbeing, anti-bullying support and resources that foster a sense of belonging and acceptance for all young people. In addition, Lori Kramer is currently exploring partnerships to establish Kelsey's Klubhouse, a physical location in the community that serves as a safe haven and support system for teens, and that creates and fosters the ideals of positivity, sense of belonging, wellness, compassion, inclusivity, community and friendship.

"I have no doubt that today Kelsey would be helping people in different ways," Lori said. "The work we do not only helps us remember Kelsey, it builds self-esteem within students, positively impacts the lives of others and encourages us to be a better friend to one another."

Kelsey Kramer used to tell her friends that people were going to know her name and she was going to make an impact in their lives. Today, like a ray of light that has emerged from the clouds of an unspeakable tragedy, there is no doubt that Kelsey's dream has come true.
