OJR's "Super Reader" Provides Fun, Innovative Way to Engage Students

Our youngest readers are donning capes and detective hats, showing their perseverance and determination for being "Super Readers" and "Word Detectives." As part of the Owen J. Roberts English Language Arts kindergarten and first grade curriculum, teachers tap into the power of play to help students imagine themselves as readers at a critical time in their reading development.

Kindergartners are learning to be super readers with a visit from OJR's "Super Reader," who helps students learn some emergent reading skills, such as: pointer power, slider power, sound power, and reread power. Recognizing that superheroes never give up in times of trouble, our readers learn that when we face trouble in our books we too can use super reading powers.

First graders build on those super reading powers in a follow-up unit of study on becoming word detectives. Students are assigned a top secret mission from the Super-Secret Detective Agency (SSDA) each day of the unit, learning to solve words with the following skills: paying attention to the beginning of the word, looking out for vowel teams, using parts of words you know, watching out for unusual words, and noticing and stopping to solve problems with words. One first grader wrote, "I learned the word 'ridiculous.' I broke down the word to figure [sic] out the sounds." Students earn their official word detective certificates as a culminating celebration, distributed by the Chief Detective of the SSDA himself!

Both units bring together research on how students develop as readers with phonics and the importance of using play for engaging students in learning to read. Using the power of play ultimately serves to transform our students into the kind of reader they imagine themselves to be, and learning about the reading process at the same time. All in fun and joyful ways!





OJR Education Foundation Celebrates Success; Invites New Partnerships

Have your children come home eager to talk about the Lego Spike Kits they used to create carnival rides and fast pass lanes during STEAM class? Maybe they were excited about the wobble stools or white board tables that they have been using in their classrooms. We partner with philanthropic individuals in the community who are parents, neighbors, grandparents, teachers, and alumni who make tax-deductible donations to the Foundation. We team up with businesses interested in sponsoring programs and those participating in the PA Educational Improvement Tax Credit (EITC) program. In addition, we run fundraising events such as our annual Fall Farm Fest, Dine and Donates at local restaurants, Comedy Nights, and the Amazing Raise.

We are currently offering two fundraising opportunities for families to acknowledge students and key individuals in the school district. First are the engraved bricks for the Legacy Walkway that leads to the stadium complex.
