<p>Your name is Special</p> <p>One of the foundational skills we focus on in kindergarten is name recognition. This skill is more than just knowing how to identify and write their name; it plays a crucial role in their early literacy development and sense of identity. When children recognize their name, it builds their confidence, helps them feel a sense of belonging, and is the first step toward understanding the alphabet and reading. Name recognition also fosters independence, as children learn to identify their belongings and participate more fully in classroom activities. By supporting this skill at home, you're setting the stage for your child's success in school and beyond.</p>	<p>When helping your child practice writing their name at home, remember to reinforce using a capital letter at the beginning of their name and lower-case letters for the rest.</p> <p>Click here for examples of name writing activities.</p>

Phonological Awareness

Phonological and phonemic awareness are important pre-reading skills, related to the ability to hear, identify, and play with the sounds in spoken language — including rhymes, syllables, and the smallest units of sound (phonemes). Children with strong phonological awareness skills are ready to become readers.
